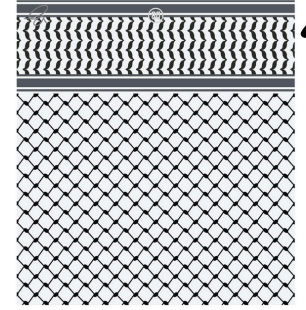


After the Six-Day War in 1967, public displays of the Palestinian flag were banned by Israel. Anyone who displayed the flag or its colors could face arrest.

Olive leaves line the bottom of the keffiyah. Olive trees are of great cultural significance to Palestinians, once playing a vital role in the Palestinian economy.

are our children.**

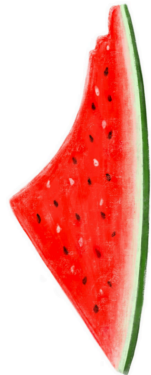

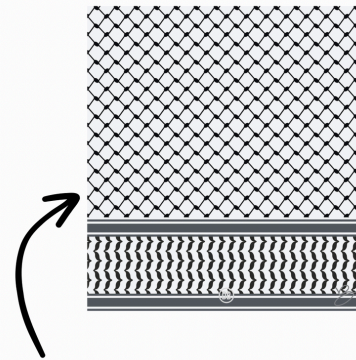

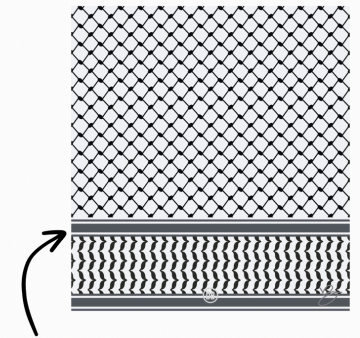

What do the patterns on the Palestinian Keffiyah mean?



The fishnet pattern – represents the Palestinians' connection to the sea. Also thought to be a symbol of collectivism – knotted individuals, stronger together. The resemblance to barbed wire a fitting nod to their 75+ year occupation.

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Bold lines along the keffiyah - represent trade routes across historic Palestine which made the region a hub for exchange. Others believe the lines represent the walls that surround the land, obstructing their freedom.
